How Did They Score?

The 1991 OLCV Legislative Ratings

We are pleased to bring you the 1991 legislative ratings of the Oregon League of Conservation Voters. This is the 10th time that OLCV has rated the Oregon Legislature since 1973. We believe this is the most valuable resource available to the general public as an overall guide to the environmental performance of our state legislators.

Listening to them talk, all of Oregon's politicians would consider themselves environmentalists. However, not many of them made the grade according to OLCV's rating of the 1991 Oregon Legislature.

This Legislature was sharply divided on environmental issues. The Oregon House, led by Speaker Larry Campbell (R-Eugene), whose average OLCV rating in the past decade has been an abysmal 20%, spent more time passing anti-environmental bills than enacting laws to protect Oregon's environment. The Senate, led by its President, John Kitzhaber (D-Roseburg), whose average OLCV rating in the past 10 years has been 96%, passed many noteworthy bills. Sadly, many died in House committees, and did not become law.

The fact that the Republicans controlled the House and the Democrats controlled the Senate had a lot to do with the difference in their grades. Unfortunately, the Republican leadership all too often lined up with

anti-environmental interests. Those legislators who followed their party leadership too closely saw their OLCV ratings decline to record lows.

The Ratings Process


The OLCV selected bills which best illustrate the Legislature's environmental positions. Only floor votes are currently rated, but that may change in future ratings to incorporate committee votes.

In the Oregon Legislature, controversy over a bill is almost always worked out in the committees, and bills are seldom amended on the House or Senate floor.

This gives committee members, and especially committee chairs, a major role in the final form of any bill. They can work in their committee to weaken, strengthen or kill environmental legislation, but still maintain a perfect record of voting on the final bills.

In developing these ratings, the OLCV Legislative Ratings Committee looked for bills that generated some controversy in their floor votes. Bills with unanimous votes were not the ones that separated the real "green" legislators from those who got the go-ahead to vote for the environment from powerful anti-environmental lobbyists.

As you can see by looking at the chart, we assign a "correct" (+) or "incorrect" (-) rating for each vote. Absences (A) are not deducted from a legislator's final rating. The percentage of correct votes determines a

legislator's final rating. OLCV encourages you to consider your legislator's individual votes on bills as well as their overall rating when assessing legislative performance. This will enable you to clarify your legislator's specific position on various environmental issues.

A few pieces of good environmental legislation were not used in our ratings because they passed nearly unanimously and represented a compromise agreed to by both environmentalists and industry. These bills which became Oregon Law included the following:

- SB 66, the Recycling Bill, sets up programs and standards to increase waste recovery in Oregon while promoting market development for those materials. This will help increase the demand for products made of recycled materials. Environmentalists' threat to go back to the voters with a recycling initiative similar to the one defeated in the last election convinced industry that it would be cheaper to make a deal in the legislature than to spend several million dollars to try to defeat it at the polls.
- HB 2244 regulates cyanide heap leach mining by establishing strong operating and reclaiming standards, providing for environmental and socioeconomic impact analyses, and allows for significant public input into the permitting process. The measure also requires mining companies to pay all regulatory and permitting costs.
- Several pollution prevention laws will require ships and facilities to develop oil spill prevention plans (SB 242), ban phosphates in detergents (SB 195), require reduced use of pesticides by state agencies (SB 262), and provide technical assistance to small businesses which generate hazardous wastes (SB 241).

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The Oregon League of Conservation Voters is a non-profit, non-partisan statewide political committee registered with the Oregon Secretary of State and the Federal Elections Commission. OLCV is dedicated to the election of candidates for public office who support conservation policies and programs.

The OLCV Board of Directors is composed of Oregonians involved in the major conservation and environmental issues in the state, including clean air and water, hunting and fishing, wilderness and wildlife protection, energy conservation and land use.

Every two years, OLCV publishes ratings of the performance of state legislators based on their votes on environmental legislation. In addition, OLCV publishes biennial ratings of the environmental performance of the Governor and annual ratings of the Portland City Commissioners.

OLCV provides assistance to environmental candidates by publicizing campaign endorsements, providing volunteer electoral assistance, and direct contributions from our Green Vote program.

OLCV's grassroots canvass makes direct contact with voters throughout Oregon to gain support for environmental candidates and make them accountable once they are elected.

Senate Votes

- A HB 2261** Land Use appeals bill which complicates appeals of land use decisions, weakens the ability of citizens to participate effectively in land use decisions, and dispenses with standards to hold local governments accountable for certain types of land use decisions. Correct vote "no." Passed 23-5. Became Oregon law.
- B HB 3343** Phases in reduction of the acres of grass seed fields burned in the Willamette Valley to 40,000 acres by 1998. Promotes the development of alternatives to field burning. Correct vote "aye." Passed 21-9. Became Oregon law.

- C SM 1** A memorial to Congress to designate the Upper Klamath River as a National Wild and Scenic River. The last free-flowing stretch of the Klamath River in Oregon is home to wild fish runs and provides some of the most exciting white water rafting in the West. Scenic River status would protect this stretch of river from the Salt Caves hydroelectric project and other threats. Correct vote "aye." Passed 16-14. Filed with Secretary of State.

- D SJM 13** A memorial to Congress and President Bush urging stronger action to address global climate change by reducing greenhouse gas emissions and developing conservation and solar energy. Correct vote "aye." Passed 19-10. In House committee upon adjournment.
- E SJM 1** A memorial to Congress to reform the 1872 Mining Law. This law allows mining operations to be developed on public lands, and can allow mining operations to buy federal lands for only a few dollars an acre.

The outdated law also does not require miners to pay royalties to the government for minerals extracted on federal land. Correct vote "aye." Passed 19-10. In House committee upon adjournment.

F SB 1163 Would have required water conservation by holders of water rights. It would also have required that half of all water saved be returned to Oregon's rivers and streams for protection of wildlife and recreational values. Correct vote "aye." Passed 18-12. In House committee upon adjournment.

G SB 184 Allows the Department of Environmental Quality to increase the maximum fines levied on violations resulting in extremely hazardous pollution up to \$100,000. Correct vote "aye." Passed 21-8. Became Oregon law.

H SB 98 Would have given the Department of Geology and Mineral Industries the authority to assess civil penalties for enforcement of regulations governing mining and reclamation of a variety of mining operations, including aggregate, hard rock, geothermal, and oil and gas resources. Correct vote "aye." Passed 23-7. In House committee upon adjournment.

I SB 5536 Provides funding for the Department of Environmental Quality to operate programs, including air quality, water quality, solid and hazardous waste, environmental clean-up, and spill response. Correct vote "aye." Passed 22-8. Became Oregon law.

House Votes

- A HB 3343** Phases in reduction of the acres of grass seed fields burned in the Willamette Valley to 40,000 acres by 1998. Promotes alternatives to field burning. Motion is to refuse to concur with Senate amendments supported by environmentalists. Correct vote "no." Passed 40-19. Became Oregon law after House agreed to Conference Committee amendments.
- B HB 3570** Would have repealed land use planning outside of the urban growth boundaries. Correct vote "no." Passed 34-25. In Senate committee upon adjournment.
- C HB 3396** Would have required the state Fish and Wildlife Commission to determine whether or not the economic consequences of state Endangered Species listing outweighed need to list. Correct vote "no." Passed 36-18. In Senate committee upon adjournment.
- D HJM 17** Memorializes Congressman Bob Smith's anti-environmental Community Stability Act of 1991. Correct vote "aye" to substitute a more balanced minority report which would have memorialized Congress to find a comprehensive solution to the needs of displaced timber workers, timber-dependent communities and the spotted owl. Substitute motion failed 45-15. An amended version became Oregon law.
- E SB 1125** Amends the Forest Practices Act: limits clearcuts to 120 acres, requires temporary scenic buffers between clearcuts, better reforestation standards. Environmentalists felt standards needed to be stronger. Correct vote "no." Passed 48-12. Became Oregon law.
- F SB 184** Allows the Department of Environmental Quality to increase the maximum fines levied on violations resulting in extremely hazardous pollution up to \$100,000. Correct vote "no." Passed 29-28. Became Oregon law.
- G HJR 41** Proposed amendment to the Oregon constitution which would have made gathering signatures to place initiatives on the ballot more difficult. Initiatives are often the best means available to citizen groups to reform environmental laws. Correct vote "no." Passed 42-14. In Senate committee upon adjournment.
- H SB 5536** Provides funding for the Department of Environmental Quality to operate programs, including air quality, water quality, solid and hazardous waste, environmental clean-up, and spill response. Correct vote "aye." Passed 41-12. Became Oregon law.
- I HB 3323** Would have removed a portion of the Nestucca River from protection as a State Scenic Waterway. The Nestucca River was part of the Oregon Rivers Initiative adopted by the voters in 1988. Correct vote "no." Passed 38-19. In Senate committee upon adjournment.
- J HB 2175** Gives Department of Environmental Quality the authority to assess emission fees on industrial air pollution to implement the Clean Air Act amendments. Environmentalists supported a more comprehensive version, which would have also assessed fees on autos, woodstoves, and field and slash burning. Correct vote "aye" on motion to substitute Minority Report. Failed 14-45. Became Oregon law.
